Child Sponsor Programme helps!

The main activity of the Child Sponsor Programme or CSP is to help poor families with a monthly amount of € 18,75 (with the current exchange rate this is £15) per child. For larger families we generally have 2 or 3 children in the programme. This may seem like a small amount, but it makes the difference between having food on the table or not, or being able to go to school. It is our great desire that families have a chance to break out of the circle of poverty. For most parents it is too late. However, with education, the children have a chance of a better life.

Supporting families financially is not the only thing we do through the CSP.

- House projects We help poor eastern European families to have a roof or doors and windows on their houses. because many of them do not have them. Have you ever imagined what it would be like to live in a house without a roof or a door and just holes in the walls instead of windows, in temperatures around -30°C during the winter?!
- Medical treatment in most eastern European countries if people do not work they simply do not have medical insurance. So if they need to go to hospital they have to pay for everything. Children, even though the basic medical assistance is free, must pay for any surgery, hospital stay or special treatment.
- **Financial 'injection'** to families in times of crisis. Everywhere in the world bad things happen - somebody is losing a job, someone in the family dies, a parent leaves the children. In these difficult times we want to provide practical support and help, not just praying for these families.
- Children's books and Bibles One of the ways we are helping is by purchasing children's Bibles in the local languages. In this way the children can read the living Word of the Lord and grow in their faith. For most of these children these Bibles will be the only books they have ever had in their lives.
- Winter shoes Children grow very fast and every year they need new winter shoes. Shoes in most eastern European countries cost about the same price as in the UK. The only difference is that people there earn about £100 per month, if they have a job at all. So you can imagine that it is impossible for families to spend all their income to buy shoes, when they have no food to eat and heating for the winter.....and many, many other needs.
- **School equipment** When you receive this magazine the schools will soon be starting again. This is one of the most expensive times of the year for many families. The schools are generally funded by the government, however students need to pay for their own notebooks, stationery, calculators, sports clothing etc. For many families this expense is too high and because of this they do not send their children to school.



As I write this article, the 2012 Olympic Games will be starting very soon.

Sports enthusiasts were delighted to hear the announcement that London had been chosen as the venue. Since then there has been much planning and expense to ensure that these games will be a great success.

The eyes of the world are now focused on the UK. Athletes are arriving in London, eager to take part and pit their abilities against those from other nations. They have trained hard and sacrificed to ensure that they are at the peak of their performance. Their countries have chosen them and have great hopes for their success.

During all these years we have been able to get involved in Christian work of different kinds. This has included prison ministry, outreach choirs, Sunday school, church and charity work etc.. We have also been able to give to support various kinds of Christian work. What needed to be done was not always what I had dreamed of or hoped for, but it was necessary in God's plan.

You may sometimes wonder what happened to some of your dreams. King David, for example, had hoped to build the temple but God had already decided that Solomon would do this, with David doing much of the preparation work.

Things may be tough at present but you can be sure that God is watching over you and will provide for every need. He is sovereign and His plans are even better than our own dreams.

Habakkuk 3:17-19 tells us :-

"Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines. Though the olive crop fails and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Saviour. LEGAL CHURCH IN ILLEGAL GHETTO



It is not politically correct to say anything negative against Islam, or to warn people of the consequences of this religion. However, it is a fact that this religion is gaining more and more ground in Europe. Bulgaria has for centuries been the physical and spiritual battleground as it is right on the border with Muslim Turkey and the Middle East and 'Christian' Europe. Even though all seems to be well in the EU country of Bulgaria, much is going on in the background. Last year we wrote in an article about a Bulgarian pastor who was nearly beaten to death by an angry mob from the local mosque. The battle still continues.

Kardzhali is a town in south Bulgaria. About difficult after their conversion as they con-50% of the population is Muslim. When walking on the streets you will hardly hear people speaking Bulgarian. Most of the people speak Turkish or a Roma (gypsy) dialect. Every city and town in Bulgaria has its Roma ghetto. Kardzhali has two large Roma ghettos and most of the Roma here are Muslims. Nobody knows exactly how many people are living in these ghettos, as the government has not taken the effort to count them. It looks as though their number is increasing rapidly, as new houses and shacks are being built every day, one next to the other, or wherever is a little space. The people build where they like, no documents and no building permits are being obtained.

One day the Lord touched the hearts of a Muslim couple, Sedat and Aishe, and they became Christians. Life became especially

tinued to live among the Muslims. They were rejected and looked down upon. This has been very tough, however, God gave them a new challenge. He made it clear to them they should build a church in the middle of the ghetto. Humanly speaking, it was a "mission impossible", but not for God. He provided everything they needed. Many churches sent them donations, and also many Christians from abroad sent them money. The building process was frustrated many times because the local Muslim government did not want a Christian church in their town.

In the end the builders started a court case in order to continue to build the church. This process took a long time as it went up all the way to the High Court in Sofia. Finally this battle was won, and the building process could continue.

The court case was not even the biggest challenge. The people from the ghetto tried to intimidate them and threatened with a petition against the church. Aishe received a Word of Wisdom from the

Lord; she said, 'That is no problem, you can sign a petition against a legal church, but we can also file a petition against your illegal houses.' The church is the ONLY building in the whole ghetto that has been built with all the official documents and permits in place.

In March this year, after two and a half years of building and court cases, the church could finally open its doors. Every week about 40 - 50 Believers meet here to worship the Lord. All of them are Believers from a Muslim background. Many of the church members have young families. There are two children's groups and one youth group. We believe that God will use these people for His kingdom!

The church has been built at a very strategic point in the centre of the ghetto. The building is visible from all sides and is just 20 metres from the main road. Everyone who wants to visit neighbouring villages or the large lakes has to pass through this road, and will pass this Christian beacon in this Muslim area!

Bread House

Life in Moldova is very hard. Seventytwo year old Praskovia confirms this. Her pension of £10 per month is insufficient to buy food. She is also looking after 2 of her grandchildren. Without help they will not survive. Praskovia and her grandchildren visit 'the Bread House' daily. In 'the Bread House' they receive a free meal. The soup-kitchen is vital for

pensioners and children. It is heated in the winter, and besides the free meal the children will also stay there to do their homework for school.

Sports clothing

PE classes are an important part of the Romanian school curriculum. To take part children are obliged to bring their own tracksuit and sports shoes. Most of the parents of the children that are visiting Casa Lumina to do their homework, are unable to provide sports clothing for their children. These children feel excluded. We want to help these 15 children to buy the obligatory sports clothing. The costs are about £30 for each child.
