An update on the work in Zhitomir (Ukraine)

In the past year we have experienced many positive developments in our work in Zhitomir. The most important was the establishment of a Medical Technical Centre. From this centre based in the Polyclinic of the local children's hospital, we give support to three city hospitals. Our main focus is still the Children's Hospital. After a big renovation project, we have now a proper working place, with separate offices. This is a great step in the right direction which will really benefit the work. Recently the hospital hired a part time worker who is based at the Medical Technical Centre. God has provided the right person at the right time. This young man, Oleksandr, is very motivated and inventive in finding solutions. It is a real blessing that there is somebody here who can maintain and repair both the Ukrainian equipment and the equipment donated by hospitals in Holland. Unfortunately, because of the crisis the (small) salaries of the hospital staff have been cut even more. This means that a technician who works 20 hours per week earns only £30 per month. With a bonus on top of this they try to keep him motivated.

News on the situation of Ami Ortiz

In March 2008 a few days before Easter, Ami Ortiz, the son of missionary David Ortiz from Ariel, Israel, accidentally picked up a bomb, which was packed inside a Purim gift. It is a miracle that Ami is still alive after the bomb exploded in his hands. Miracle after miracle happened in his life and today he is doing very well. For more than 18 months the Ortiz family has lived with the knowledge that this bomb was meant to kill David, Leah, Ami and a visiting friend and that the terrorist was still walking around free. Recently a person has been arrested and is a suspect in their case. From their newsletter, the following information:



He returned to the U.S. and when he immigrated, he began to be active again in 2006. He carried out a number of attacks the last two of which were the bombing in our house, and the attack on Prof. Ze'ev Sternhel.

based on their belief system and ideology. Therefore we need to be prepared to use all of our legal rights in order to defend not only our freedom to worship and practise our faith, but for the defence of the whole Body of Messiah in Israel.

Despite the insistence of the police at this time that Teitel was working alone, there have been articles and interviews with terror experts claiming that there is no way that he could have succeeded to act alone. The secret service also has stated that others are involved and other attacks are being planned. We also have information confirming this. His methods were extremely sophisticated and he didn't leave behind evidence. The investigation is ongoing, and so we ask your prayers that all the darkness will be revealed.

At the beginning of November we were featured on Israeli News, and the 2nd November we appeared in the major newspapers in Israel. We asked for prayer from the Body of Christ in Israel for wisdom and for Yeshua to be glorified in us, and I pray that was so. In one of the broadcasts David had the opportunity to express our prayer that the Lord would have mercy on the perpetrator and on his family because he has brought shame on himself, his family, and on Israel by his actions. Please continue to pray that we will be sensitive to His voice and open our mouths only for His glory in the coming days as there will be many follow-up reports.

The results of our case will, God willing set a precedent in Israel, because it is the first case of Jewish terror against other Jews

Recently the media-gag order was lifted from the arrest of the suspect in our case. We found out the details of what has been discovered and about the individual that brought the bomb to our house a year and a half ago. His name is Yakov "Jack" Teitel. He is an American citizen who immigrated to Israel in 2000. Before he officially immigrated, he visited Israel in 1997, and within a couple of months murdered two Palestinians in cold blood, one an Arab taxi driver, and the other a shepherd around the area of Hebron.

CSP: Heating for Eastern Europe

Update on the work in Iași (Romania)

The playground in Iași is frequently being visited by the children from the area. Twice a week the doors open for the children to play there. Also schools know their way to "Noah's Ark." The children really enjoy the trampolines, the slides, the water pump and the sand pool. They also love the animals. Recently two rabbits, two ducks and two turtles have been added. A really good relationship has been built with the children from the village. It is very clear that these children beg for positive attention, the local teacher told us that most children suffer at home. They suffer from poverty, negligence, which is often caused by alcoholic parents. Recently we started with a weekly club for the children with problems at home. We do arts and crafts, games and sing. We help them forget their problems for a little while.



Evangelism in Ukraine



Viki Antal is a young Christian woman from Beregowo a town on the border of Hungary. Every day she visits several groups of children and tells them the Gospel. Every week she visits a local boarding school. At the school a group of young children, aged 7 to 16, listen intently to what Viki has to tell. Viki prays with them and also teaches the children to pray on their own. Together the children join in with a Christian song. Viki teaches them a chorus sentence by sentence. The children learn quickly, and at the end of the day most of the children know the song by heart. If there is still time they play a game or do some arts and crafts. Of course there are some sweets and a glass of juice. The children of the boarding school really enjoy their afternoon programme. It is very important that these children hear the Good News of Jesus Christ. Viki knows how important it is to continue telling the Gospel to these children and teenagers in Ukraine.

Later on, the table was laid with the china "Cottage garden" tea-service, and we all tucked in to

sandwiches, jellies, sausage-rolls, mince-pies and Christmas cake. Then there were carols round the piano, for didn't we only have Christmas because Jesus came to Earth to die for us...? It was all simple fun and fellowship, but I love to remember those times. Nowadays, materialism has hidden the true meaning of Christmas, while political correctness even wants to rob us of our right to celebrate his birth at all! More than Santa

Sometimes the charitable activities of missions like ours are criticised by the kind of teaching that places spiritual values and preaching the Gospel above all. Organising relief transports, giving clothes and financial support to the poor, makes people sometimes accuse us of playing Santa Claus. In spite of that we wish to keep to the teaching of Jesus in Luke 12, where he speaks of God caring for us materially when we seek to have treasure in Heaven rather than on Earth. He even said: "Sell all your belongings and give the money to the poor". While this is not the case for everyone, there may be times when God will speak even this to one of his children. Jesus says: "Come after and follow me!"

So in the view of Jesus the whole Santa culture is indeed reprehensible because it is simply too limited and does not meet God's standard. This puts also the question to us: Can we be a real follower of Christ if we have not dedicated all our material possessions to God, to do with as he tells us? Are we not indeed too many times playing Santa, giving small gifts to others, sometimes even older gifts we received and passed on to save the money? Jesus' life expresses that God gave us all that he had, and he wants us to simply do the same. Many people and Christians do not want to go that far and find out at the end they have lost even what they had. Let us motivate and support each other in reaching out to help, in a greater way than we have so far.

TRIP TO BULGARIA AND MACEDONIA

On Saturday, 24th October, Gerrit Wiersema and trustee Kelton Black went on a ten day trip to Bulgaria and Macedonia to visit projects, and to witness how the Lord is working in the Balkans. Following is a report of their experiences.



Bulgaria

Sunday morning, after breakfast we went to visit missionary Segun and his family, where we discussed the programme for the next two days. In the evening Kelton and I visited a Bulgarian church; it was really good to worship together with our Bulgarian brothers and sisters in the Lord.

On Monday we first joined a pastors' meeting in the Roma gypsy ghetto, in the meeting we also met up with Craig Sibthorpe, a British missionary, who oversees most of the projects. After this

It had already started, so Segun decided that we would only play a game, rather than doing all kinds of different training exercises. I joined one of the sides, and Kelton stood on the edge of the pitch, taking pictures. The next day Segun guided us to the inner centre of the ghetto,

meeting we went to a warehouse for second-hand goods which is run by Taki. His vision is that this warehouse should be a self-supporting profitable business that makes money for the ministry.

In the afternoon we visited Segun's main project, FC Jutvari. I had fitted nine pairs of new and secondhand football boots, goal keeper equipment, two pairs of gloves and some socks in my luggage. Also Kelton brought two pairs of football boots, and loads of vitamin tablets for the team with him.

this is a no-go zone. We wanted to visit the captain of the football team, who was ill. But his illness was so severe that he had to be taken into hospital. So we decided to drive back, but, praise God, we didn't have any problems with people in the ghetto.

In the evening we had a church service in the clubhouse of Jutvari. Roma gypsy church meetings are always special and so was this one. I could not understand a word of the worship, but it was sung with a lot of passion. Kelton did the preaching. After the meeting we had to say Goodbye to all the people from the ghetto, as the next day we had to leave for Macedonia.

Macedonia

The Journey went very well and in the early evening we arrived in Strumica, a town in the south-east of Macedonia.

We met up with our local contact Zoran Spasovski and a few members of a team from Rochdale. We would be joining them in the upcoming events in this city. It was also great to meet up again with Peter Graham, the final member of our group.

Just after we arrived, Zoran asked us if we could be ready for action in about 15 minutes, as an evangelistic meeting was planned in 2 hours and we had to prepare everything.

Within a few minutes we were ready and joined the rest of the team; Kelton, Peter and I joined the 8 strong Rochdale group and about a dozen Macedonians from Skopje and the Strumica area. The Rochdale group and the Macedonians had handed out leaflets to over 3,000 people, and invited them to come to the event in the local theatre.

The favour of the Lord could be clearly seen on this outreach. Earlier that day a few of the Rochdale team had been on local TV and radio, and they had also gone into the prison. Following is a quote from Zoran's report on this:

a local farmer and also pastor of 5 churches. After a short introduction about the evening he invited the Rochdale group to sing a few songs, followed by 2 testimonies. Then the band from the youth church, Glasnost, from Skopje, played a few upbeat Gospel songs. After the concert Pastor John Nuttall explained the Gospel in an easy, understandable way.

Vane asked whether people wanted to meet with the Lord, and wanted to be prayed for. Over 50 people stood up and wanted to commit their lives and were prayed for.


Also in this meeting 15 prisoners escorted by police were present. The presence of God was so obvious around them, many of those men were crying and repenting. We also prayed for those who asked for

On the 28th, we had a visit to the Prison in Strumica where we had a meeting with Tatjana, the warden, who was very pleased to have us in her office. We prayed for her and prophesied over her life. She said that she felt very unusual and peaceful. We went down to the prisoners where we had a few worship songs and John Nuttall preached to them about Jesus and how Jesus can set them free. We gave a Salvation call, and I have to be honest I didn't expect that any of those 30 plus prisoners would respond. To my surprise 15 prisoners stood up, repented and prayed for Jesus to come into their lives. God's presence was in that prison room.

Around 7 pm, the people slowly started filling the pews and half an hour later, the hall was filled with over 150 people. The people were welcomed by Vane,

God to heal their sickness.

The next day we visited Banica, and went up a small hill on the outskirts of the village to pray over the village, which is known to be a no-go zone for practically anybody wanting to come and talk about any religion. Most people who have tried to make converts, Muslims, Jehovah's Witnesses etc. have been beaten up and forced out, for the villagers there can be very violent and hostile.

About a year ago Zoran and Sasha, his Pastor, visited this village and started speaking in a shop. Within a few minutes a crowd had gathered and people were very interested, they actually asked them to come back. A few weeks later they came there to show the Jesus film. In a

small square in the centre of the village they projected the movie onto one of the houses. When they first put everything out nobody was there, but 20 minutes into the film, about 600 people had gathered. Afterwards more than 200 people wanted to dedicate their life to the Lord and were prayed for; even a small house church was planted on the outskirts of the village.

Many spiritual manifestations have been going on in this village; people encountered Jesus in their dreams, people saw angels pouring oil on the church and the word ISUS (Jesus) was written in a cloud above the house, while the sky was otherwise completely clear, no clouds for miles!

In the evening we had a programme similar to the day before, about 110 people came to the event. After the

programme, more than 30 people said they wanted to become a born-again Christian.

This evangelistic event was even more successful than the team had expected, knowing that the work in Strumica only started a few months ago. We are very excited at what God has in store for this area!
